Following a meeting between the two countries leaders, Chavez and Zapatero, Venezuela has agreed to sell oil to Spain at 100 dollars per barrel in exchange for building materials, medicine and new technologies. The oil price recently reached 147 dollars but dropped back to 125 dollars

agle Goes Missing from Madrid Safari Park. A Pigargo eagle has gone missing from a Safari Park in Madrid and the park has offered a 500 euro reward for its return. The bird has leather identity rings on its legs and experts believe it can probably survive in the wild. The brown bird with a white head is much larger than the Spanish Imperial Eagle. As it is a large bird, it cannot fly long distances and so it's thought that it might still be close to the safari park.

Samy, the first Asian elephant to be born in captivity in Spain, was born at the Selwo park in Estepona on July 19th. The elephant, which weighed 91 kilos at birth, is doing well

panish Government Proposes Energy Saving Measures. The Minister for Industry in the Spanish government has put forward an energy saving plan for the nation consisting of 31 measures. These include: new rules on air conditioning and heating in public buildings; increased timetables for public transport; reduced street lighting; sponsorship of a scheme to put one million electric or hybrid cars on the roads by 2014; increased use of low energy light bulbs; and possible speed limit reductions on the roads (after agreed study).

merican Airlines Joins BA and Iberia. Following the recently reported link between British Airways and Iberia, American Airlines have now joined the agreement with them to form a transatlantic trade pact. There have been protests from other airlines suggesting that a monopoly has been created but BA bosses intend to press for approval of the arrangement by American and European authorities during this year. The three airlines will co-operate commercially on flights between the US, Mexico and Canada and Europe, Switzerland and Norway, creating a route network serving 443 destinations in 106 countries.

ree Fruit on the Beach. An initiative by the Ministry of the Environment this summer will see free fruit distributed on the beaches of Malaga, Alicante, A Coruna and Ibiza. The intention is to increase the proportion of fruit consumed in Spain from the current 17.4% and thus promote healthy eating among the people of the country



IGO, Spain (AFP) — Equipped with long-range cameras and ultra-sophisticated electronic equipment, a helicopter stands ready on the deck of the Tarifa, a Spanish navy frigate at the forefront of Europe's attempts to rein in illegal fishing of the threatened bluefin tuna. Increased sea patrols, satellite surveillance and reconnaissance flights are just some of the unprecedented steps the European Union has deployed this year to try to control fishermen in the Mediterranean and Atlantic — and protect this

threatened species. But with prices soaring -- mainly in Japan which alone imports at least 70 percent of bluefin tuna caught in the Mediterranean, according to European Commission officials -- the chase shows no sign of ending. Catching illegal fishermen in the act is a bit like looking for a needle in a haystack "because there is no foolproof system," said Marcelo Vasconcelos, the head of the European Fisheries Control Agency which inaugurated its new headquarters this month in the Spanish port of Vigo. Battle for Tuna Stocks. The

European Fisheries Control Agency, based in Vigo, has mobilised 49 ships, 16 planes and 78 inspectors in its fight against illegal blue fin tuna fishing in the Mediterranean and Atlantic this year.

With the economy hovering around 1.6% growth this year, unemployment at a high level and inflation at 5.3% Prime Minister Zapatero has interrupted his holiday to call his government together for action. The action plan will be announced early next week.

Panair Cancellation Plans on Hold. Demands for transparency from the EU to Ryanair over their threat to cancel tickets bought through third party websites seem to have resulted in doubts that the action will take place. Having started court

ood Prices Rise As Fuel Prices Fall. As food prices continue to rise with increases of almost 65% year-on-year on some items consumers are seeing some relief in fuel prices as petrol and diesel have dropped about 5% from a July high.

onest Illegal Immigrant Hands in Wallet. A 44 year old Nigerian illegal immigrant working as a street trader in Sevilla has been rewarded by the owner of a wallet he found in the street. The man, who sells tissues at traffic lights in the city, received 50 euros from the owner after risking his stay in Spain by stopping a police car and handing in the wallet containing 2700 euros.



On 11 September Catalonia commemorates the defeat it suffered at the hands of the Spanish troops of Felipe V of Bourbon in 1714. Catalonia, which had been a sovereign nation up to that point, lost its national rights and liberties, with its own laws abolished and Catalan language and culture banned.

After many years of darkness, in 1932, under the II Spanish Republic, Catalonia acquired a Statute of Autonomy which recovered some of its national rights. However, after the Civil War, the Franco dictatorship brought with it the toughest repression that Catalonia



had ever endured,
to a point that
could be described
as attempted
cultural genocide.
Thousands and
thousands of

people suffered retaliation and many were shot. These even included the President of the Government of Catalonia, Lluís Companys, the only European president executed under Nazism-fascism.

In 1979 the new Statute of Autonomy of Catalonia was approved, giving the country its own institutions and government, but to date a satisfactory level of self-government has still not been attained.





Every 11 September, many Catalans continue to demonstrate in the streets to demand recognition of our national rights and liberties and a greater degree of self-government.

The Festival for National Rights and Liberties is organised as a political event of Catalan civil society, to celebrate the National Day in a festive way yet as a protest. We want to make this celebration a political event of affirmation and national demands, in an open and participatory way. For this reason, since the year 2000, around two hundred institutions from Catalan civil society have staged an event that includes an exhibition of these organisations, the reading of a manifesto that has the support of all the organisations involved and finally a music concert to round off the celebration.


We want to share this festive protest with all the people who live in Catalonia, whatever their place of origin. Only if we attain greater capacity to decide what we

want our country to be like in the future can we construct a nation that is fair, caring, integrated and sustainable.

OH GIVE ME A HOME!

Every year about 100.000 dogs and 200.000 cats are abandoned here in Spain. Every summer, with its giving way to autumn, brings on the neglect and the slaughter. Ten thousand are victims of automobiles, which may cause as many as 3,000 traffic accidents and over 1,000 personal injuries as a result. Over half of these victims are created in summertime. These little cute.

fluffy, playful puppies or kittens grow up and as adults their needs and attitudes change, requiring more attention.

This is just one of the justifications, (if you need one) to visit one of the local protective societies when looking for a pet, and adopt from any number of their many orphaned or abandoned animals. It also affords you the opportunity to reflect on your motives in acquiring a new family member before buying one from a pet shop or a breeder.

If you feel saddened by this seemingly neglected feral feline population, rather than just putting some scraps or proper food out, properly adopt one or two, or convince your community to adopt some. To have them properly cared for, including worming, flea and tick treatments, vaccinations, micro-chipping and spaying or neutering. They will help to contain the unwanted rodent population, rats and mice, as well as, by their presence, the arrival of new unwanted strays, being territorial animals as they are.

Visitors and or vacationers come out for a month or less and see these cats coming around to the place they are renting and they start to feed them. These animals then start to come around regularly and they continue to feed them until that date arrives that they have to return from whence they came and the cats are, in the best (situation) of cases, abandoned again or the worst case scenario, which has happened, that they take this more or less healthy animal to a veterinarian to be killed, not euthanized which is the painless taking of a life of a terminally ill or dying animal, as they are no longer going to be around to feed it!

Why did they not think about this before they started to feed the animal(s) in question? There are now healthier unwanted cats about that are more prone to breed. This reproduction cycle when left unchecked, may in only five to ten years, from just one pair of cats having only 2 litters a year of just 3-4 kittens per litter, produce hundreds of thousands to millions of cats, if not more!

The community may call an agency out to round up the strays for their culling. This

often leads to cases of mistaken identities where animals with families are collected and confused as strays are caught and may be killed! Another even desperate solution has been reported. In many cases the presence of unwanted cats leads to the illegal placement of

poisonous substances in an attempt to reduce the feral feline population. This indiscriminate placing of poison may affect cared for pets or even children!

Your stay here is over but their lives continue, please look into the possibility that one of the local protective societies may be of help in placing them into a new, more permanent home. Inform yourself as to what options are available through your local town hall to care for abandoned animals. If your reason for turning this friend out on its luck is because you have to leave the area temporarily, try to find a friend or a boarding kennel to care for your pet until you return and are able to be reunited.

HOT SUMMERTIME BLUES

It is hot and the dogs are panting, they must be thirsty! Yes it is hot and all of us should have access to plenty of fresh drinking water, the dogs' panting however doesn't necessarily reflect thirst, it is one of their ways to control their body temperature as they don't have sweat glands the way other animals have. They do have sweat glands in the soles of their feet which is the reason why you may see them standing in water when it is hot, their feet also have a vast supply of superficial blood vessels which help facilitate heat exchange. Domestic cats have a similar physiology and response to heat as dogs, not so with horses as they are able to sweat and may do so profusely. Heatstroke or sunstroke (hypothermia) which is an increase in the body temperature up to or beyond normal physiological regulation is something that all domestic animals are susceptible to. This may be due to high environmental temperature, high humidity, or inadequate ventilation. Direct exposure to the suns' rays may also be a contributing factor, as transporting or movement of a number of domestic cattle, horses or other livestock as well as keeping dogs in confined quarters without proper ventilation. Heat cramps are common in working horses in the intense heat, as they sweat and may also suffer from a lack of salt. In the cases of heatstroke you will observe rapid breathing and

sometimes they may pass out. vomiting and/or diarrhoea may also occur. An attack of heatstroke requires urgent attention, such as a cold water



bath is the most immediate response while seeking out professional help. Think twice about taking the dog or cat for a ride while running errands, or if you are travelling with them this time of year do not leave them unattended in a closed car in the sun, even in the shade with the windows cracked open a bit these days may be a bit much for them! Where ever you and your animals may be make sure they have access to fresh water and shade. If you wish to find where the coolest spot in the house or garden is, locate where the dog or cat may be stretched out!

While on the subject of abandoned animals, hunting season has started and with it the annual parade of groups of hunters and their dogs traipsing through the underbrush. Many of the dogs they have with them are untried and some are either gun shy or simply not good hunters, so what will be their destiny? All too many just get (in)conveniently left behind. If you witness anyone engaged in such cruelty please remember that it is now against the animal cruelty laws on the books in Spain and is a punishable offence, get a automobile registration number and report it, you can make a difference.

Oh and by the way if you and your pets are out for a countryside stroll on the weekends, and not hunting, wear bright colours and keep your head down! .


Changes have recently been made to the State Pensions system. In the main, these changes will only affect you if you reach State Pension age on or after 6 April 2010.

These reforms will make it easier for people who reach State Pension age on or after 6 April 2010 to build up full State Pension provision.

These changes were introduced by the Pensions Act 2007 and the Pensions Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

Basic State Pension is the retirement income you can claim once you have reached State Pension age if you have paid or been treated as having paid sufficient National Insurance contributions, or received credits during your working life. Key changes to basic State Pension include:

* reducing the number of qualifying years needed



YOGA FOR ALL

As a yoga teacher I find that one of the most frequently asked questions is one centred on the students

concern for their sensitive back. There is sometimes be a pre-existing belief that we need to be super flexible before we begin practising yoga to avoid further back pain. The truth is that anyone can practice yoga. The yoga asanas (postures) give muscles and ligaments a slow, non-violent stretch, easing sensitivity and pain in the spine and entire skeletal system. At first glance it seems to be little more than a series of strange physical postures. But in time, anyone who continues with a regular practice becomes aware of a subtle change in their approach to life and a tremendous freedom from long held physical stiffness and back pain.

Muscles that are stiff and weak with under use will cause

A yoga class is designed to stimulate the circulation, and to work systematically on every part of the body so that muscles are healthy and in balance. Back care yoga will keep us young and agile throughout our lives easing our passage through the later years.

Print only sections of a web page

Save on your printer ink by selectively printing in Windows programs such as Microsoft Word, Internet Explorer, WordPad, Outlook, etc. To do this highlight portions of text you wish to print and click print. Increase decrease size of font with wheel on mouse

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CHALLENGES OF GARDENING IN CATALUNYA

EALTHY GARDENS By Clodagh and Dick Handscombe gardeners, authors* and broadcasters living in Spain for over twenty years.

Most expatriates move to Spain with the intention of a less stressful and healthy outdoor life than the one experienced in northern Europe. However that is not always achieved and at times the design and maintenance practices of the garden are often the cause. We therefore list some of the things to be avoided.

1.Ensure the air is fresh and safe for the family, pets and wildlife. These day's bio/eco/ organic soil

> fertilizers, improvers, insecticides and fungicides are available to replace the hazardous chemical products. Each of our books gives practical guidelines in this respect. If you cannot find eco products available locally try www. happyecogardens.com.

2.Don't garden beyond your current level of fitness until you have built up strength and stamina in the local mountains as well as moving earth and rocks. If you have purchased an enormous piece of land for isolation, peace and a low price and it is too large just develop a manageable area around the house and leave the rest to go wild within the local fire regulations which may require you to strim it once a year.

3.Get used to working early and late to avoid the midday sun...and wear a woven straw hat which has 18 a cooling effect. The hat will also help you become accepted by the locals.

4.Use ergonomic tools especially secateurs and mattocks and minimise the use of a fork, spade and pickaxe. Get help with the heavier jobs.



5. Grow healthy vegetables from day one so that they can be enjoyed while the garden is carved out ..which could take a number of years! Like wise plant a few fruit trees early on for the benefit of their blossom as well as fruit.



6. Avoid the need to constantly use insecticides and fungicides by avoiding the over watering of plants, especially the more drought resistant plants (see Part Four of our book Your Garden in Spain).

7.If you are allergic to pollens don't plant pines, bottlebrush, acacia and male carob trees.

8.Plant plenty of aromatic herbs for their aromatherapeutic effects, as well as healthy culinary and medicinal uses. We will discuss this in more detail in a later article.

9. Avoid spiky plants that can cause accidents alongside terraces and paths or avoid altogether especially if children are likely to visit.

10.Ensure you retain or plant trees and large shrubs for summer shade and sheltered winter sun.

11. Wear knee pads or kneelers when doing low work. Rocks are rough, there may have been Processionary caterpillars in the spring and spiky things often await a fleshy knee.

ANCHORS AWAY

fter many years of boating for fun in the UK and holding down a 'proper' job, the decision was taken in 2005 to turn a hobby into a livelihood and follow a dream.

The 1st minor detail was to move 'Sloopy' a 37 foot sailing boat from Chichester to the Med. The original idea of the destination was always a bit vague; 'somewhere in the south of Spain' was what was said when asked! It was always hoped that it would become clear on the way and anyway on the dull grey day of departure, anywhere in the sun seemed a better place to be!

After crossing the English Channel to Le Havre, the mast was taken down and Sloopy temporarily became a canal boat. We entered the River Seine and made our way to Paris which is a very special place to be in your own boat and we were almost expecting someone to tell us to move on. From Paris the route became the canal system of central France with its 350+ locks and eventually the rivers Saone and Rhone to the coast. It was a bit of an adjustment to

take to sea again but the inviting blue Mediterranean made it an easy transition.

To cut a long story short, the trip onwards to the south of Spain was ended at Tarragona when it was realised just what Catalonia had to offer. We might not have the spectacular coastline of say the eastern Med but there is a lot more and Tarragona makes a great base for the business we wanted to run.

In 2006 we finally gained the final documents necessary to run 'Sloopy' as a commercial vessel and for me to operate as a professional skipper. Since then we have been running day trips and holidays and more recently we have received approval to run internationally recognised training courses.


In a day it is possible to spend the time just sailing or take a break anchoring is one of many beautiful bays. The crystal clear warm waters are perfect for a snorkel or just a swim. A day can also provide a great introduction to sailing. It is enough time to see if it is really something you would like to do or take the first steps in gaining a qualification. A very popular option has been celebratory

trips where we have been happy to lay on additional surprise treats.



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FIVE IMPORTANT POINTS TO CHECK BEFORE SELLING YOUR PROPERTY

elling a Spanish property in the present economic climate is no easy feat, but there are still a few people buying out there. The good news is that 'time wasters' have virtually disappeared: today's buyers are here to buy, well informed and will usually be legally advised.

Getting the sale price right is the single most important factor for selling in the current market, but it's equally important to prepare for the sale — make sure all legalities and documentation are in order. Here are some of the key points you should address in order to minimise problems and avoid frustrating delays later on:

1) Check your property is correctly registered at the Registro de la Propiedad

Have your *escritura* (title deed) checked to make sure it accurately describes your property. If you have a country *finca*, check the house appears on it and is described as fully as possible, and verify that the land area shown corresponds with the real area.

Some anomalies can be dealt with at the notary's office on completion of sale, but you need to be aware of issues that could impede or delay a sale. Land Registry rectification involves costs in the form of taxes, notary fees and registry



charges

2) Make sure your property is correctly described at the *Catastro*

While the Registro de la Propiedad is Spain's principal land registry, the Catastro registry is part of Hacienda, the Spanish Treasury. Catastro information —which includes the *poligono* and *parcela* numbers— is used to calculate local IBI rates. In Tarragona province, these are collected by the BASE agency.

See how the Catastro describes your property on their website at http://ovc.catastro.meh.es/, and check it is in your name by looking at your IBI receipt or by calling the BASE agency.

Again, some inaccuracies can be solved when you complete the sale. Unlike the *Registro de la Propiedad, Catastro* modifications are usually free of charge.

Check too that you are up-to-date with IBI rates payments. Country properties with a dwelling often pay separate rates on house and land.

3) Check that your well is legal

Buyers looking for *fincas* with own or shared wells will want proof that wells or boreholes are duly registered with the *Agència Catalana de l'Aiqua*—the Catalan water authority.

It's quite easy to check if a well is registered, and usually possible to register it if it isn't. Registration is not expensive but takes a few months, so get it done well in advance.

If your water comes from a community irrigation scheme, you should have the contract between you and the irrigation association, receipts for initial connection charges and your most recent water bill. If you have your water analysed, keep the relevant documentation too.

4) The cédula de habitabilidad

As of April 2008, a habitation certificate —the *cédula de habitabilidad*— is now required when any *vivienda* (dwelling) in Catalonia is sold.

This certificate requires a simple, stamped report from a surveyor or technical architect (*aparejador*). Once you have the report, the *cédula de habitabilidad* takes about a month.

If a property needs work to meet the standards required for the *cédula*, an alternative document will also allow you to complete the sale. It simply states that, if that work were carried out, a habitation certificate could be issued.

5) Consider a bank valuation/structural survey

Getting the sale price right is essential for selling in the current market, but in the case of country properties that's sometimes easier said than done.

Your estate agent should be able to give you a sale price of course, but an up-to-date bank valuation is a great way to help convince buyers that your asking price is realistic and that the property is in good shape.

On the subject of condition, buyers are usually advised to have a structural survey carried out, and you have a duty under Spanish law to inform would-be buyers of any defects that aren't readily apparent and that materially affect the value of a property.

So if you are unsure of just how sound your property really is, it might make sense to commission a structural survey yourself.

Take time to get all your documentation together and have a copy made. This should include the *escritura*, *IBI* receipts, all planning permission documents, the end-of-work certificate, and documents related to the water and power supply.

If your property has a solar/wind/generator power system, be sure to keep any receipts, guarantees and maintenance records.



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ho is Santa Tecla?

During the year 48, in the city of Iconium, St. Paul preached in a friend's house. Opposite lived Tecla, daughter of Teoclia ,who was from a young rich family and she was promised in marriage to Thamyris. However, she became ecstatic with the preaching of St. Paul and

decided to follow him on his pilgrimage.


Teclas fiancee denounced St. Paul as a sorcerer and he was jailed. Faced with this situation, Tecla distributed her jewels among the poor and used them to bribe guards to secure the release of St. Paul. From this point, Santa Tecla and St. Paul travelled together and Christianised the world. On their travels, Sant Paul and Santa Tecla visited Tarragona and preached on many subjects.

Later when Santa Tecla followed her evangelical mission alone, she was persecuted by the enemies of the Christianity, jailed and suffered terrible torments but remained unscathed. The martyrdom of Santa Tecla includes, amongst others, the following torments: She was thrown into a pit with poisonous reptiles and survived; she was as tied between two oxen, to be torn about, but the oxen lost their strength; she was then placed on a pyre to be burnt alive, but the fire died away. Finally, she was sent to the Lions who licked her wounds and they healed. Defeated, her persecutors released her and she lived in a cave, as a hermit, dedicated to prayer until her old age. . Nevertheless, in a new aggression, soldiers were sent to find her. Santa Tecla prayed to get rid of the new tormentors and to remain pure. The cave collapsed leaving only Santa Teclas's arm. The followers of Santa Tecla retrieved the arm and took it to Armenia to give burial and worship, from there it was transferred to custody of the Cathedral in Tarragona and a plaque was dedicated to her memory.

hy is Santa Tecla the patron saint of Tarragona?

The first key reference in the Christian communities of the Camp de Tarragona dates from century III AD. In a document of an anonymous monk who gathered data on the introduction of the Christianity in the Iberian Peninsula wrote of the great devotion that the people of Tarragona had towards a "blessed Thecla virginity", Also in 1117 Count Ramon Berenguer III conquered Tarragona and donated the land to the Church. Given the devotion towards Santa Tecla, in the area of Tarragona, they decided to name their patron, Santa Tecla, since she was the disciple of San Paul and visited the holy city. (Now historians consider it very unlikely that St.

Paul visited the city)



22 September is the date set for the singing of vespers at the Cathedral, which is the centre of the festivity, as well as the performance of dances by the guilds throughout the city, plus the Cercavila ("the big parade in the streets"). On 23 September, a religious service takes place, as well as the Procession of the Holy Arm, under a canopy, through the streets. Other festivites include:

The Mind of the Kettledrums | The Giants and the Dwarves
The Dance of Checkers and Old People | The Dance of the Àliga

With the rising cost of flights Brits are considering taking their holidays closer to home, and where better to go than a traditional British seaside resort. The resort of Great Yarmouth is like taking a step back in



time without the aid of Dr Who. In spite of 'improvements' little seems to have changed since the 1950's. The resort had hoped to become one of the

However, this didn't happen so the resort has to present the 'Las Vegas' experience through its gaudy slot machine arcades with names like Caesars Palace, Atlantis and the Silver Slipper. The latter appears to have been bolted onto the front of a block of Council Flats cunningly renamed the 'Silver Slipper Holiday apartments'.

Great Yarmouth is certainly not short of places to eat. I'll admit to not being exactly slim, but a visit to Great Yarmouth always gives me hope. Some of the largest people you will see anywhere, outside the USA, gravitate towards this place where they can ingest chips and other greasy food at every opportunity. Large wobbly people dressed in matching shell suits, which at one time must have served

as World War 2 barrage balloons, trundle their way from one eating emporium to another munching as they go.



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THIRD WORLD TO TEACH WHITE PEOPLE HOW TO WALK


AS the price of oil climbs towards \$150 a barrel, the Third World has offered to teach Europe and America how to walk.

Africa is home to the world's most skillful walkers

With millions of Western commuters descending into urine-soaked panic, African and Asian walking teachers are now preparing for a surge in demand for their services.

Thomas Otangwe, a walking consultant from Zaire, said: "I first learned to walk when I got a iob as a farm labourer.

"The farm was 20 miles from my home, but for the first week I would stand in the street wondering where my beautiful car was. Eventually I realised I could not afford a car and so I began to walk.



"Walking is relatively simple. You start by putting one foot in front of the other and then slowly increase the rate until you have reached a steady pace.

"You should then continue in this way until you arrive at your chosen destination. This is the key to successful walking.

"You may want to stop along the way for a cup of tea or a snack, but remember: you will have to start walking again."

Mr Otangwe added: "We have produced a handy booklet with diagrams and an introduction to advanced walking, but be quick because the price is going up all the time."

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MOST ATHLETES LIKELY TO SURVIVE OLYMPICS, PLEDGES CHINA

LESS than 50% of the athletes competing in this year's Olympic games will be killed by airborne poisons, the Chinese government said last night.

Beijing early today

Amid fears the pollution was so thick no-one would be able to see where they were going, the organisers have given runners a headlamp and a horn to prevent them from bumping into each other.

But the Chinese authorities admitted there will be 'many, many casualties' amongst both competitors and spectators in the shooting, archery and javelin competitions.

Olympic president Jacques Rogge said: "I am assured the pollution levels will only affect those engaged in vigorous physical activity."

He added: "It is right that we celebrate the great Olympic traditions of freedom, cooperation and physical excellence in the midst of a murderous dictatorship where no-one can breath."

Observers say the pollution levels may lead to a scarcity of new world records with the



Marathon competitors being given permission to break their 26-mile journey with an overnight stop.

Meanwhile world leaders have gathered for what is tipped to be a vast and terrifying opening ceremony during which China is expected to arrest everyone in the stadium before launching a full-scale invasion of the moon.

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DRIVING IN SPAIN By Chris Dann, Car Import Spain

have had a few enquiries recently regarding the use of a UK driving licence with a Spanish registered vehicle. The following has been taken directly from the Mossos d'Esquadra guidelines.

Firstly, in order to drive a vehicle on a public highway in Spain you must be in possession of a valid driving licence. You must carry your licence with you at all times. Furthermore, your vehicle must be fully road legal in the country of registration. This means that, in the case of a UK registered vehicle, it must have a current MOT and it must display a valid road tax disc. You must also carry with you valid insurance from the country of registration.

Licences issued by EU Member States

If you have established your residence in Spain, you can apply for your licence to be exchanged for a Spanish equivalent. Alternatively you may continue to use the driving licence issued in your country but it has to be registered with the Register of Drivers at the Directorate General of Traffic (DGT) for your province.

Licences issued in non-EU countries

Any individual living in Spain and in possession of an NIE number or residence/work papers can continue to drive on Spanish highways for up to six months using the licence issued in their own country. After this period their licence must be exchanged for a Spanish driving licence.

As well as EU member state countries, Spain currently



has bilateral agreements for the mutual acknowledgement and exchange of driving licences with Algeria, Andorra, Argentina, Chile, Colombia, Croatia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Japan, South Korea, Morocco, Paraguay, Peru, Switzerland, Uruguay and Venezuela.

This means that if you are a US citizen and only have a US driving licence. then you will have to take a Spanish driving

test in order to obtain a Spanish driving licence.

The ITV. Regularity of inspections.

- •A new car or motorcycle is subject to an initial inspection after four years. After that, they are subject to inspection every two years and when they have been in use for ten years they must be checked every year.
- •Vans and crossover vehicles up to 3.5 tonnes must be checked every two years. After six years they must be checked yearly and after 10 years, every six months.
- •As of February 2009, mopeds must undergo an initial inspection after three years and be checked every two years thereafter.
- A Spanish ITV is not valid on a UK registered car.

Finally, I have had numerous emails regarding the six month law for re-registering a UK registered vehicle.

EU law states that you are allowed to drive your UK registered vehicle in Spain for up to 182 days in any 365. After that it must be taken off the road for a continuous six month period or be re-registered with Spanish national plates. It must, however, remain fully road legal in the country of registration.
